Mayoral Message

On behalf of the citizens of Nagasaki, I would like to extend this message to the "2018 Earth

Caravan."

At 11:02 a.m., August 9th, 1945, Nagasaki instantly took devastating amounts of damage from a

single atomic bomb. 74,000 precious lives were lost, and a further 75,000 were injured. Even today,

73 years after the bombing, many hibakusha, atomic bomb victims, still suffer from exposure to the

radiation.

The hibakusha, who carry deep mental and physical wounds that will never heal, have continued to

retell their painful experience, appealing for the abolition of nuclear weapons. They are driven by

their firm resolve, believing that no one in this world should ever again suffer as they have.

The adoption of the "Treaty on the Prohibition of Nuclear Weapons" at the United Nation in July

2017 has fulfilled the long awaited wishes of the hibakusha and the civil society which has been

longing for a peaceful world. Through this news, I sensed a big shift towards a world free of nuclear

weapons. To those of us who have continued to appeal for nuclear abolition, this gave us the

conviction that we are working towards the right path and the courage to continue delivering our

message. For this treaty's early entry into force and its establishment as an international norm, it is

necessary for members of civil society to continue raising their voices.

Together with everyone who wishes for a world free of nuclear weapons, we the citizens of Nagasaki

City will continue to work toward nuclear abolition and the realization of everlasting peace.

Through the "2018 Earth Caravan." I hope that you will share our wish for peace and spread the

voice calling for the abolition of nuclear weapons.
